

DICTATORS HALL OF SHAME

Activity Description

Students will learn about different dictators then will compare life in a dictatorship to life in a democracy.

Suggested Grade Level

Middle school (grades 6–8)

Estimated Time to Complete

One class period

Objectives

Students will be able to

- identify powerful dictators in the world;
- contrast dictatorships with democracy.

Materials Needed

- Printed-out articles from *Parade Magazine* (http://www.parade.com/dictators/2009/)
- Paper
- Timer

Activity Procedures

- 1. Hang articles about each pre-selected dictator around the room.
- 2. Place students in small groups and assign them a dictator to start with. When reading about the dictator, the students need to take notes, writing down important information (name, years in control, reason for their rank).
- 3. Give students three minutes at each dictator, and then have them rotate until they are back to their original location.
- 4. Debrief students by discussing some of the information that surprised them.

5. To conclude, create a Venn Diagram comparing life in a dictatorship to life in a democracy.
